He will be speaking about his experiences in a refugee camp in Chad with 27,000 refugees, in a field hospital in Sudan with up to 700 kala azar patients and 100 children in a malnutrition ward, setting up a therapeutic feeding center in Uganda, while relating war and health in a broader sense. Description:

Over the years the UCSF student community has not been able to reach out directly to the large LGBTI population within San Francisco. The 2006-2007 UCSF LGBTSA hopes to change that trend with a new LGBTI community service outreach project. LGBTSA hopes to use the money provided in this Community Service Training Event grant to train interested students for this project. Tobacco and the LGBT Community

Description:

Smoking prevalence in the LGBT community is among the highest for any segment of the California population. Tobaccorelated disease is one of the leading preventable killers of LGBT people. Many LGBT organizations accept funding from the tobacco industry and the queer press helps keep smoking normalized with tobacco ads and ubiquitous imagery of smoking. Few resources are allocated to address tobacco-related issues in the LGBT community. UCSF Researchers Libby Smith, PhD, and Naphtali Offen will present the results of their recently completed 4-year grant to study tobacco industry targeting of the LGBT community with principal investigator Ruth Malone. Those attending the session will learn about tobacco industry tactics to reach out to this community, responses of LGBT leadership and the community at large to those tactics, the role of the queer press in addressing tobacco-related issues, and why those interested in LGBT health should care about this issue.

Description:

The Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Intersex (LGBTI) community has been a growing and constantly changing underserved population in health care. While UCSF has started to make steps towards increasing education about the health issues prevalent in the LGBTI communities, the UCSF student community currently does not have a direct avenue to reach out to the large LGBTI population within San Francisco. Description:

The LGBTI Health Elective is an annual event put on by the UCSF LGBTI Student Association in order to educate the UCSF community about LGBTI health issues. Topics for this year's class include: Gay Men's Health, Lesbian Health, Harm Reduction, LGBTI Youth, Queer Parenting, Intersex Health, Transgender Health, LGBTI Mental Health. In addition, we plan to have Good Vibrations come and give a workshop designed to increase participants' comfort with their own and others' sexuality. They have presented at numerous colleges and universities, as well as in a variety of health care settings. This presentation is interactive as well as didactic, and is designed to be low risk and comfortable for diverse participants. They have presented four times in the last six years at UCSF and have been very well received by the students.
